Dear County Commissioners and Ravalli County Board of Health,

You have had a shrine to birth defects in Hamilton for many years, but I am sure that none of you noticed it. It is a large photo of Yellowstone Bison on the south end of a building about a block north of main street (see photo). The very large male bison on the extreme left of the photo has almost no visible scrotum, just a bump where the testes are under the skin. The male bison on the extreme right in the photo has a very visible quite long scrotum. Whenever you disagree with what I have reported concerning birth defects, maybe looking at that photo will help you understand that the birth defects on wild and domestic animals and on newborn children are real.

Since little attention was paid by government agencies to the four studies we published on the birth defects and other health issues, I wrote a book called *Changing Faces: The Consequences of Exposure to Gene and Thyroid Disrupting Toxins*, which chronicles over 20 years of observations regarding the changes in the faces and the vital organs of vertebrates throughout North America. Included is discussion of how people and other animals, plants, and the entire biodiversity of our planet are being dangerously affected by a combination of factors, one being recent excessive use of pesticides.

For example the recent decline in pollinators here in the Bitterroot Valley strongly affects fruit and garden vegetable production. A fungicide, Chlorothalonil, has recently been strongly implicated along with the insecticides called Neonicotinoids in causing pollinator deaths, especially wild and domestic bees. I have been trying to bring the serious effects of Chlorothalonil exposure on vertebrate species to the attention of the County Commissioners and the Board of Health for over 20 years to no avail. The cyanide in the Chlorothalonil is in itself extremely toxic to people and other animals.
